 - a. Summit in partnership with South Arts of Creative
 Placemaking starting March 5th
 - b. Want to create a moment of stitching together two sides of the beltline, showcasing the history of the neighborhoods north and south of the tunnel and creating historic recognition in an acoustic experience through the Krog Street Tunnel by having HPC choir sing across the tunnel. It will bring attention to the neighborhood, the Krog Street Tunnel, and its unique history. From Dekalb history to Robert Shaw and the American sound.
 c. Q: Will you be tapping into the other neighborhoods besides Cabbagetown? A: Would love to connect with them.
 - d. The summit will be at the Woodruff Arts Center for Creative Space Making and will include the nine southeast states. The Krog Street Tunnel event, which garnered great support from the area, will be important for attendees regarding creative place making. John will be giving a Forward Warrior!! Tour. Attendees to be inspired by the community. Curtis has been cataloging art in the tunnel and will tour that. Performance itself will be 30-40 minutes; Spellman Glee club on each side of the sidewalk spread out, 44 singers.
 - e. This will be a public experience. Site visit to keep pedestrian traffic open and free even during the performance. Welcome sound from the beltline during the performance.
 - f. Logistics Permit to close tunnel, 1:30p 4p closure technically. Four police officers to ensure safety. Waiting to hear back

from the city for what they will need - to be not disruptive to the neighborhood. We want the neighbors to participate but not get it out too much to the general public.

g. Detour signs to stop congestion in the neighborhood. 97 Estoria has agreed to host a bathroom and trash. People will be moved if any emergency vehicles need to come through. They will have a detailed description for summit-goers to please leave it better than you found it. People experiencing homelessness will be invited. They do not want to displace anyone in the tunnel.

h. Q: Thank you for encouraging our history. Part of this is to enjoy the art and murals. Could we try and fundraise for Forward Warrior!! during this event? A: It's a great idea. Next steps? We would like to include Cabbagetown as a partner when giving information to the attendees.





In Partnership with the Cabbagetown Neighborhood Improvement Association (CNIA), Georgia State Epic Pop Culture Program, and the Georgia State Council for the Arts, Resurgens Requiem is a 45-minute performance, featuring the Spelman Glee Club performing selections from their upcoming tour. The performance is produced by Creative Placemaking Communities as part of the South & Appalachia Creative Placemaking Summit held at the Woodruff Art Center, March 5-8, 2024.

C'town Chows: Same Same, But Different



Now that Dry January is officially over (not that we participated), it's time to take your tastebuds out for a spin and enjoy a drink and treat yourself to a night on the town. There are some new spots we've heard we must try, but some of them aren't totally new. Meaning, they have a different name and different menu, but they're in the same building with the same owner and the same deliciousness.

If you have social media of any kind, you've probably seen the latest concept by *Ford Fry* over in *Westside Provisions*. What was formerly known as *JCT Kitchen* (famous for their Southern Fried Chicken), Fry has now opened a trendy, classy French joint dubbed *Little Sparrow*. Perfect for a romantic date night or a swanky evening with your fancy friends, you'll find sophisticated cocktails and the French fare to match. The Le Petit Martini, described as a small yet truly exceptional icecold gin or vodka martini, is nicely balanced and crisp.

After you're liquored up, we implore you to start your meal off with the Onion Soup Gratinée (also known as French onion soup). It sounds basic, but we'd say it's the best version of itself in Atlanta, which we don't say lightly! The broth is savory and rich, the caramelized onions are silky soft, the sourdough is spongy but upholds its structural integrity, and the gruyére cheese melted on top is ooey and gooey yet crispy in all the right places. Bon appétit! They also serve a beautiful French Baguette with what they call "good butter," extra virgin olive oil and flaky salt – meant to compliment any appetizer or entree perfectly, and we agree!

As for entrees, the Main Sea Scallops are nice and light yet rich in flavor with three scallops seared to perfection sitting atop sauteed cabbage and drizzled in lobster cream and caviar. For a heavier dish, you can opt for one of the classics – Dry-Aged Burger with American cheese, onion and frites. You'll also want to order a side of Frites with an assortment of dips, such as their Raclette Service.


Must we say more? While we didn't order dessert (shocker, we know), their 'Fancy' Soft Serve ice creams looked out of this world.

If going all out for a fancy meal isn't your thing but you still want to class-it-up without all the hassle, their upstairs bar, *Bar Blanc*, serves cocktails, wine and only one food item – Steak Frites. So, if you're not a meat eater, you'd want to eat a snack beforehand. The bar is a first-come, first-serve situation, but it's perfect for a pre-dinner aperitif and post-dinner digestif.

Another nearby spot that's recently gone under a bit of a rebranding is *Stereo*, formerly known as *Victory Coffee* and *Calamity*. Stereo acts as a coffee shop during the day and transforms into a cocktail bar and listening lounge in the evenings. *Victory Brands* still owns this spot, so you'll get the same friendly service and eclectic vibes you know and love.

While they don't serve a full dinner menu, you can enjoy some small bites to accompany your libations, such as Open Faced Sourdough Crispbreads with an assortment of unique toppings. Of course, you can go to **Lloyd's** for a slice of pizza and walk next door for a drink and enjoy some live vinyl to close out your evening.



The Lexington (Kentucky) Convention and Visitors Bureau appears to be desperate for tourists, the Associated Press reported. HISTORICAL VISIONS

Our neighborhood historians, Jacob and Nina Elsas of The Patch Works, have been busy giving talks around town. You can find details on their website www.thepatchworks.com/news.

In January, Georgia Tech Library's radio show and podcast – Lost in The Stacks – featured a discussion with The Patch Works and the Georgia Tech Archives about their nearly decade long research collaboration exploring the life of Jacob Elsas, Cabbagetown's founder. The show is a great primer for Tech's exhibit wrapping up next month. Georgia Tech's Fulton Bag & Cotton Mill: New South Industry exhibit. Located in Georgia Tech Library's first-floor Price Gilbert gallery.



"Through an array of fascinating artifacts, photographs, and historical documents, visitors will witness the mill's evolution, its impact on the local community, and the lives of the individuals who worked there," said Jody Thompson, head of the Archives, Records Management & Digital Curation department. "Don't miss this chance to explore the milestones, challenges, and innovations that defined the Fulton Bag and Cotton Mill's legacy."

The Georgia Association of Museums announced in early January that the Georgia Tech Library's "Fulton Bag and Cotton Mill: New South Industry" won its coveted 2024 Museum Exhibition Award. Last October, Nina took part in 'Unraveling History: The Fulton Bag and Cotton Mill from Past to Present,' a panel discussion about the legacy of Fulton Bag & Cotton Mills, its relationship with Georgia Tech, and its contemporary role as a unique educational resource.

LILIANA CALLS FOR ENHANCED SAFETY FOR BILL KENNEDY WAY



There are only a few Atlanta byways more confounding than Carroll Street: Bill Kennedy Way is one of them. Responding to their constituents, Atlanta City Council members Liliana Bakhtiari and Jason Winston issued a joint statement Wednesday on the need for increased safety on Bill Kennedy Way:

"Recent crashes on Bill Kennedy Way are not isolated incidents and reinforce the need to enhance safety at the bridge, which falls under the Georgia Department of Transportation. Also, Bill Kennedy Way is a key part of the Atlanta BeltLine's Southside Trail plans. The BeltLine has worked with GDOT to program a project that would deliver a separate trail bridge over I-20, parallel to Bill Kennedy Way, as well as permanent trail installation through Glenwood Park south of I-20."

"Community engagement meetings on this are set for the spring. As options are explored, we will continue pushing for design strategies that include long-term solutions for improving traffic conditions and promote increased safety for cyclists and pedestrians."



URBAN TIMBER IN C'TOWN



In recent years, we have lost quite a few of our big, majestic trees for a variety of reasons.

Trees don't live forever, and sometimes

taking them down is the right thing to do. I'm hoping that when those times come in the coming years, we can be mindful of the potential to give those trees a second life.

During the early days of Covid, I was learning about what happens to trees that come down in the city and the potential that is often unrealized as these valuable specimens get

hauled off to a landfill, ground up into mulch, or both. My cousin Whitney taught me a lot about the process, and I even learned to run a sawmill, which is a crucial component of giving downed trees a chance to continue to be useful.

As more and more large trees have come down in Cabbagetown, I find myself wondering what happens to them. I also wonder if we can repurpose some of them here in the neighborhood. Individual homeowners can certainly have things made from them, such as tables, desks, shelves, etc. Along those lines, I think it would be worth exploring the creation of benches, tables, etc. for our public spaces.

Imagine going to our parks or the Community Center and sitting on benches made from trees that were standing when the mill was first built. What might that feel like? Sure, it's just wood, but it's OUR wood. It's not material that comes from some far-away place that's being deforested to satisfy the demand for cheap furniture. Not every tree that comes down is a good candidate for furniture, but many trees (in particular white oak) have incredible potential to make quality, durable, and beautiful items that could end up outliving all of us.

If you have one of those big trees in your yard that needs to come down, there are resources to consider. The Atlanta Wood Foundation is a 501(c)(3) on Memorial Drive whose mission is "to foster and promote Urban Forestry and the use of low-cost Urban Lumber, by salvaging fallen, dead, and unwanted trees that would otherwise end up dumped into a landfill." Over in Avondale Estates, "The Jack Ellis Company aims to design and build handcrafted one-of-a-kind furniture by re-using, recycling, reclaiming and repurposing salvaged wood and other materials."

As the proud owner of a live-edge solid pecan table that came from a tree felled in Atlanta, I can say firsthand what a joy it is to watch the process of a wood slab becoming a custom piece of furniture. The stories the wood can tell are quite interesting if we simply listen. I'm hopeful that soon, we will have public amenities created from our majestic trees so they will continue to provide value to the community far into the future.

Anyone interested in giving a tree a second life, reach out to me and let's chat. Who knows – we may end up sharing a meal at a table made from it in the coming years!

NEW AFFORDABLE HOUSING COMING TO 04W

The redevelopment of affordable housing along Atlanta's Boulevard is moving forward in a significant way this month, continuing the decade-long quest to transform Boulevard's reputation as a rundown corridor saddled with dilapidated public housing and vacant lots into that of a more vibrant, but still accessible, intown community.

Wingate Multifamily – a newly formed affiliate of Massachusetts-based Wingate Companies, a longtime major property owner on Boulevard – has kicked off demolition efforts for a project called *Boulevard North in Old Fourth Ward*. Spanning from 579 Boulevard to 495 Boulevard Place, roughly two blocks from *Ponce City Market*, the site was previously occupied by four apartment buildings, each standing two stories, that have been razed.

For Wingate, Boulevard North marks the fourth phase of its redevelopment efforts along Boulevard – and part of the company's broader "City Lights" masterplan for the neighborhood. Plans call for a five-story building with 88 new units that Wingate calls "secure and well-appointed" for families previously residing in *Bedford Pines*, or what's commonly described as the Southeast's largest Section 8 housing project.



According to *Invest Atlanta*, the new apartments will all be rented at rates attainable for households earning 60% of the area median income or less. That translates to the smallest studio units (549 sq.ft.) going for \$1,275 monthly and the largest three-bedroom options (1,143 sq.ft.) for \$1,900, according to Invest Atlanta's tabulations in 2022. The development will be supported by HUD housing assistance, meaning residents won't pay more than 30 percent of their income in rent, Invest Atlanta officials said.

Boulevard North amenities will include a central laundry facility on each floor, a fitness center, private courtyard, after-school programs, and a business center with computer stations.

Wingate is forecasting construction on Boulevard North to be finished in July 2025. When that happens, 387 of the total 733 units that comprise Bedford Pines will have undergone redevelopment, according to the company. All told, roughly 700 more units of affordable and market-rate housing are in the City Lights pipeline along the Boulevard corridor, according to Wingate.

Fried Twinkies


