Tuesday, October 9th, 2018, 7p Cabbagetown Community Center. Meeting Conducted by Katie Butler. Minutes recorded by Karyn Corell.

Called to order at 7:04p by Katie Butler. Welcome and announcements: Still looking for a new president. CNIA membership application is online and must be completed to vote. Motion to approve September minutes. Seconded. Unanimously in favor. Jake pointed out error about grant status for a *Patchworks*

project noted in August minutes.

City of Atlanta - Valencia Hudson: Not able to be here this month. Katie shared some notes related to city issues. City Council is working on some kind of legislation for *Airbnb* issues. We'd like to be involved and propose our Affordable Housing Committee tackle this topic. Gaskill pothole patched. Neighbor complained about late or lack of notice of filming events/closures. Tiffany Morgan (our film liaison) chimed in, giving synopsis of the process and other logistical details. She is creating a "best practices" for filming here/using Ctown. Also noted, we can ask for money but we aren't likely to get any. We do not get to approve these projects as a neighborhood. Neighbor asked about trees that block traffic view. Call 311. We are still following up with the trash issues and negotiating trash can placement options for properties like upper Tye Street.

APD - Lt Crowder, Zone 6 Evening Commander: If you hear gunshots, call 911. Increased patrol on Carroll Street since armed robbery last month. Crime in zone 6 down 11% YTD. Neighbor asked about attempted robbery by a "mob" of 8 people on a porch in Summerhill recently (posted on *Nextdoor*). APD said this is not common at all. Another neighbor asked about seeing odd circumstance with a bike rider and a baby. Not criminal, just stupid. Any other questions, email djcrowder@atlantaga.gov

Treasurer - Sandra Rueppel: We are \$3,000 in the hole. Newspaper ad revenue is down and printing costs are up. Maybe shop printing costs to other vendors.

NPU - John Dirga: Smoke detectors and batteries are available at Fire Station #10. They suggest sleeping with your bedroom door shut for additional barrier. No glass is being recycled in blue bins, so take it to *CHaRM* on Hill Street in Grant Park. CHaRM also shreds documents. Motion to support renewal of NPU bylaws going unchanged. Seconded. Unanimously in favor. *Imagine Memorial* community input opportunity wrapping up soon. Need to create CID to advocate. *Chomp* needs Porch Jam porches and help with Cabbage Games. Starting at the end of October, *MARTA* will be working to enhance your experience by renovating both the North

and South pedestrian bridges at the Inman Park/Reynoldstown Station. The North bridge will begin construction starting at the end of October 2018 and finishing in March of 2019. The parking lot north of the station will be closed during the construction period. Following the completion of the North Pedestrian Bridge, *MARTA* will renovate the South Bridge beginning March 2019 and finishing in October 2019. The bus loop will remain open to customers during the renovation process. The *Zipcars* will be removed from the station during construction.

Transportation Committee: Next Meeting is October 18th at 6:30p at *97 Estoria*.

Affordable Housing Committee: New Lead: Rich. HB 820 on ballot in November. VOTE! Increased concerns over the number of *Airbnb's* and short term rentals in the neighborhood pushing citizen renters out. It is illegal to have short term rental without business and hotel licenses. Violators must be reported. Reports say we have 50 *Airbnb's* out of our 400 homes. Look at airdna.co to see stats. Several neighbors expressed concerns.

Cabbagetown Initiative - Paul Freeman: CHOMP! \$5 spoons for Ctown residents avail at *Little's, Sweet Cheats* and most of our local businesses. Still need volunteers & chili cooks! Billy (chatty guy sleeping on far park bench) has been moved to a shelter. Check for \$7,000 was received from default sponsor realtor. Reminder: CI meetings are open, so please come if you'd like.

Chicken Noodle Network - Lisa Myers: Need more volunteers before we can officially kick-off. Sign-up sheet was passed around.

Old Business: None.

New Business: Patchworks announcements: Humanities Lecture October 28th from 3:30p to 5:30p. Music on October 13th at 2p, Cabbagetown Crawl-O-Ween is October 27th. Correction/retraction from last newspaper edition: Patchworks has NOT received the full grant for the stage improvement project, but has cleared the first hurdle in the process.

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Let's Make History (again)

Georgia is a state with a long track record of making history, and we are on the cusp of another historical moment, should Stacey Abrams be elected Governor on November 6th. But first, a few historical facts about our state:

Wesleyan College (formerly the Georgia Female College) was the first all-female college in the nation, dating back to 1836.

Savannah was the founding site of the Girl Scouts in 1912.

The Georgia Warm Springs Foundation was founded in 1927 to help patients with polio by Franklin Delano Roosevelt, who would later become a US President.

Georgia native and globally-recognized civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 for his groundbreaking work on civil rights and social justice.

Ted Turner launched the world's first 24-hour cable news network, CNN in 1980.

Atlanta hosted the 1996 Centennial Olympic Games.

Former Georgia Governor and US President Jimmy Carter received the Nobel Peace Prize in 2002 for his decades of work *"to find peaceful solutions to international conflicts, to advance democracy and human rights, and to promote economic and social development."*

Georgia is at an inflection point.

Now, on November 6th, we have the chance to make history yet again by electing the first female African American Governor in the nation, Stacey Abrams. Beyond Stacey's obvious qualifications as accomplished Minority Leader in the Georgia House, when you listen to her message, it's clear that she is a forward-thinking leader with compassion and understanding of how public policy can help people throughout the state.

Stacey has already made history by participating in the Atlanta Pride Festival & Parade as the first major party candidate for Governor to do so. I marched in the parade with her on October 14th and saw firsthand how much energy she inspires in the community.

To be sure, Georgia has dark chapters in its past, and as a native Georgian, I have direct experience with some of them. We have a chance in this election to send a strong signal to the nation (and indeed the world) that we have progressed beyond the historical divisions and fear-inspired rhetoric that has cast a negative light on an otherwise beautiful and diverse state.

Georgia is at an inflection point. Are we going to evolve and embrace bold thinking that will allow us to continue to prosper and attract world-class talent, be a beacon for what's possible in this great nation, and show that we are capable (much as we did in the 1960s) to defy the odds and inspire the world with game-changing leaders? Or, will we retreat from our rightful place as a harbinger of historically significant movements and cling to a fleeting past based on fear and prejudice? Will we truly listen to the will of the people, or will we continue to allow the erosion of the pillars of democracy?

This is what's at stake on November 6th.

There could not be a clearer choice.

For this reason, Stacey Abrams has my vote. I hope she has yours as well.



Editor's note: This is part two of a story that began in last month's edition of The Cabbagetown Neighbor.

"You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven."

Did you know that good old landlocked Cabbagetown had a lighthouse? Okay so maybe not a *literal* lighthouse.

Not only did Friendship Church ask CNIA to find another meeting place, they gave Larry Camp's and Tom Houston's ministries the boot as well. Larry however was not discouraged. He was determined to not only find a place for CNIA to meet, but to continue the work he and Tom had started with the youth in the neighborhood.

Realizing that he didn't want to run into the same issue again with the neighborhood group, he found a separate place to hold CNIA meetings and a place to continue the ministries he had started.

The CNIA meetings moved to the **Salvation Army** building on Carroll street, which would remain CNIA's home for years to come. After a brief run in a house on Gaskill Street owned by Lois and Howard Regan, **Lighthouse and Village Kids Ministries** oddly moved into the Craft building. The very building where CNIA began, became the home of a new movement in Cabbagetown. Shortly after Larry left Friendship and his term as president of CNIA was over, he turned his focus to the youth of Cabbagetown.

Tom continued to have Friday night programs for the younger children, while Larry started a sports program for the teenagers. The idea was to keep them off the streets, doing something productive with their time. Though many folks in the neighborhood doubted it would work, it did!

In order for the teenagers to play on the team, they had to attend a meeting every Thursday and to help out with various projects in the neighborhood. But they still managed to sometimes get into trouble. Bobby Clark was one of the coaches who dedicated his free time to helping the teens by teaching them not only how to play, but how to be a team.

Rebecca Camp and I often talk about those times. How at the time it seemed like we were all fighting a losing battle. But the leadership and example of true unconditional Christian love that Larry exhibited every day, showed us the way. We can see not only his profound legacy as a founding member of CNIA, but as a lighthouse for all the souls that would be lost today, if not for the light that shone from Larry's heart.

Slim's Chomp Pickin's (and then some)



November means Chomp & Stomp in Cabbagetown. Since its inception, C&S has not missed an opportunity to celebrate our rich musical heritage, and this year's lineup is smoking good.

Once again the Music Dude with the magic touch, John Dirga, has pulled together a plethora of hardcore bluegrass, old time string bands, and classic Americana honky tonkers to entertain the masses. With three stages and a slew

of porch jams scattered around the hood, there is something for everyone, except the metalheads. Sorry.

The Joyce Brookshire Amphitheater hosts some interesting acts, and our fearless leader Katie Butler is playing fiddle (or is it a violin?) with TWO bands! First up at 1p she (and her uber-talented husband Steve Seachrist) jam with **Evan Stepp and the Piners**, a consortium of young and talented classic country performers doing original and tasty covers. At 3p Katie takes the stage again with the eclectic **W8ING4UFOS**, featuring members of Cabbagetown's legendary **Smoke**. Finally, at 5p **Rodeo Twister** closes out the afternoon. This hot western swing/hillbilly trio delivered one of the most entertaining performances of the Cabbagetown Concert Series events in 2018, and will no doubt bring it again at Chomp.

The MAIN STAGE in Cabbagetown Park features some of the regular stalwarts of the festival, with the always entertaining **Georgia Mountain String Band** kicking off at Noon. At 2:30p **Smokey's Farmland Band** returns to occupy the masses while the chili does its dirty work, then at 3:45p we are lucky to have **Rev. Jeff Mosier and his Newgrass jam band** rocking the joint. I dare you to sit still for this one.

Over in Peachy Park, the schedule is a bit lighter, but the returning **Arlo Finch** brings his unique singer-songwriter skills all the way from Rome (GA., duh) at 3:30p, followed by the tight acoustic trio **Control Burn** at 5p.

Sadly, the music ends at C&S at 6p, so let's take a look at what other cool shows are happening later in the month.

Wed Nov. 7 Billy Gibbons @ Variety Playhouse – The solo blues shows of **ZZ Top** guitarist Gibbons may not meet the expectations of a hardcore Top fan, but the man can play. It's just as down and dirty as the band's first few (incredible) albums, and definitely worth a listen.

Thur. Nov. 8 Brian Wilson @ the Fox Theater – The former Beach Boy genius has gotten an incredible second wind in his 70's, with the successful "Smile" and "Pet Sounds" tours reviving some of the greatest American music ever written. This time around he is

doing a "Greatest Hits" tour, so you can expect lots of surf, car, and girl songs, along with some hipper deep cuts. Brian doesn't sing much of the high parts these days, but it is a thrill to see him so happy and healthy.

Tues. Nov. 13 Dave Alvin & Jimmie Dale Gilmore @ City Winery – Alvin was a Blaster, and Gilmore was a Flatlander, and both have made some absolutely brilliant solo albums. Regardless, together they work with each other in a complementary manner, and we will see if the sum is greater than the parts (as the parts are pretty damn good).

Tues. Nov. 20 John Legend @ the Fox Theater – an excellent singer and songwriter, Legend is smart enough to avoid the more obvious R&B clichés, and delivers material that both entertains and makes you think. Super talented, and he knows how to make it work.




W8ING4UFOS: At the Brookshire Amphitheatre at 3p.

He is amazing.

Transforming Cabbagetown: Back in the Day

By 1978, the Mill property went into receivership, eventually being sold to the Norfolk Southern Railroad, (later to become CSX Corp). So did hundreds of residential properties that had been owned by The Mill.

Opportunities were offered to residents to buy the homes, but given the low wages and subsistence living that The Mill had promulgated among its employees, only a few of those still in "company houses" took advantage of the offer.

Most had lived hand to mouth, depending upon the stability and largesse of the only employee and protector that they had known. Few had put aside money for a down payment for a mortgage on a home. What remained was a real estate developer's nightmare - or fantasy - depending on how you look at it: hundreds of properties in a ****potentially**** prime downtown location were dumped onto the market as the former residents fled, squatted, or fell into the trap of renting from absentee "slumlords." Large swathes of homes fell empty, vulnerable to the ravages of the elements, vandalism and apathy, eventually falling onto the rolls of tax liens or worse - slated for demolition. Through it all, many old time resident stubbornly remained, insistent that *"we shall not be moved!"*

Anyone paying attention to Atlanta politics between 1976 and 1980 would have found it hard to miss the political fracas surrounding The Mill's closure, this years-long struggle pitted community activists - including Atlanta City Council members - against the railroad - as they struggled to get assurances for their worried constituents living in the shadow of The Mill that the proposed facility would have only limited impact upon them.

A parallel struggle played out to get assurances that the Mill site itself would be repurposed into something that would be a continuing asset to the neighborhood, and to the city at large. Job retraining and employment commitments were also sought. Among those negotiating was City Council Member Esther LeFever, one of Cabbagetown's fiercest advocates. Two other City Council members would later become mayors and play pivotal roles in helping the community move forward - Maynard Jackson and Bill Campbell. Emotions were charged, the atmosphere bitter.

Eventually, a deal was struck. The new owners of The Mill came up with a set of proposed mix-use ideas for the impressive 19th century buildings, as well as an agreement to levy a tariff on every truck coming into and out of the facility to be deposited into a fund to be used by Cabbagetown (and Reynoldstown) for community development ("*Piggyback Fund*").

To the chagrin of some in Cabbagetown, the City signed off on the deal, allowing for the construction of the Intermodal

Facility, subject to CSX living up to its agreement to repurpose The Mill as a "good neighbor gesture" to the community. The major detail unresolved in this agreement - the cause of so much future distress - was a clear arrangement as to the disposition of the properties left in a state of limbo when The Mill divested ownership. CSX didn't want them. The City didn't want them.

Those that could buy - did. What happened next is a case study in the human emotions of greed, compassion and the power of economics...



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Georgia State, Emory, Oakland Cemetery and Manuel's Tavern

In 2015, a team of local scholars and educators from a group called *Atlanta Studies* launched a mission dubbed “Unpacking Manuel’s.” As Manuel’s Tavern, the historic Poncey-Highland watering hole, neared a major renovation, historians and longtime patrons worried the decades of history adorning its walls was at risk of being lost or altered.

So, Georgia State University educators such as Ruth Dusseault, Brennan Collins, and others took it upon themselves to painstakingly chronicle the location of – and story behind – each and every artifact hanging in the bar.

Three years later, the fruits of their labor are still visible via high-definition maps of each of the beloved tavern’s walls. Visitors of the website (unpackingmanuels.com) can click through a history lesson of each dusty painting or pendant on a virtual tour of Manuel’s.

Now, a likeminded group, including people like Spencer Roberts, co-director of GSU’s Student Innovation Fellowship, has formed to tackle a similar challenge: mapping Oakland Cemetery.

This time around, the technology that researchers are using is bigger and badder – and so is the ground they’ll have to cover.

Georgia State University’s Student Innovation Fellowship, led by Collins, of Unpacking Manuel’s acclaim, recently partnered with Emory University to test their mettle at creating a three-dimensional model of the 48-acre graveyard, as well as every headstone and statue within it.

The two-school coalition also linked up with Atlanta-based creative studio *Beam*, which is lending its tech tools and expertise to help teachers and students document the past and present of the nearly 170-year-old cemetery.

Beam connected the research team with equipment like drones, rovers, and cameras galore to try to simplify the daunting task of immortalizing each and every crevasse or fracture the historic headstones have endured.

“Using a DJI Inspire 2 drone and DroneDeploy software, Beam’s Logan Riely captured over 12,000 images to create an orthographic scan of the 48-acre cemetery and surrounding 12 acres,” according to Beam’s project page.

On land, the team wheeled around a “Motion Impossible M-Series rover equipped with Phoenix Ranger Lidar system” – lidar is kind of like sonar, but with lasers instead of sounds – to make a map of Oakland Cemetery’s Jewish Flats section.

The Beam team is showing involved students how to use Canon SL2 cameras to “capture high detail scans of each stone and marker inside the Jewish Flats,” according to the site.

In addition to making 3-D renderings of the cemetery and its fixtures, the project entails an abundance of research by students from varying studies who will be digging into the backgrounds of each structure – just like they did with Unpacking Manuel’s.

The end result will be that every single Oakland headstone and statue will be immortalized as a 3-D rendering.

The project’s launch comes on the heels of another preservation effort at Oakland Cemetery.

Members of the Historic Oakland Foundation recently kicked off a fundraising drive, seeking \$10,000 to help repair the cracked and crumbling tombstones at the cemetery.
