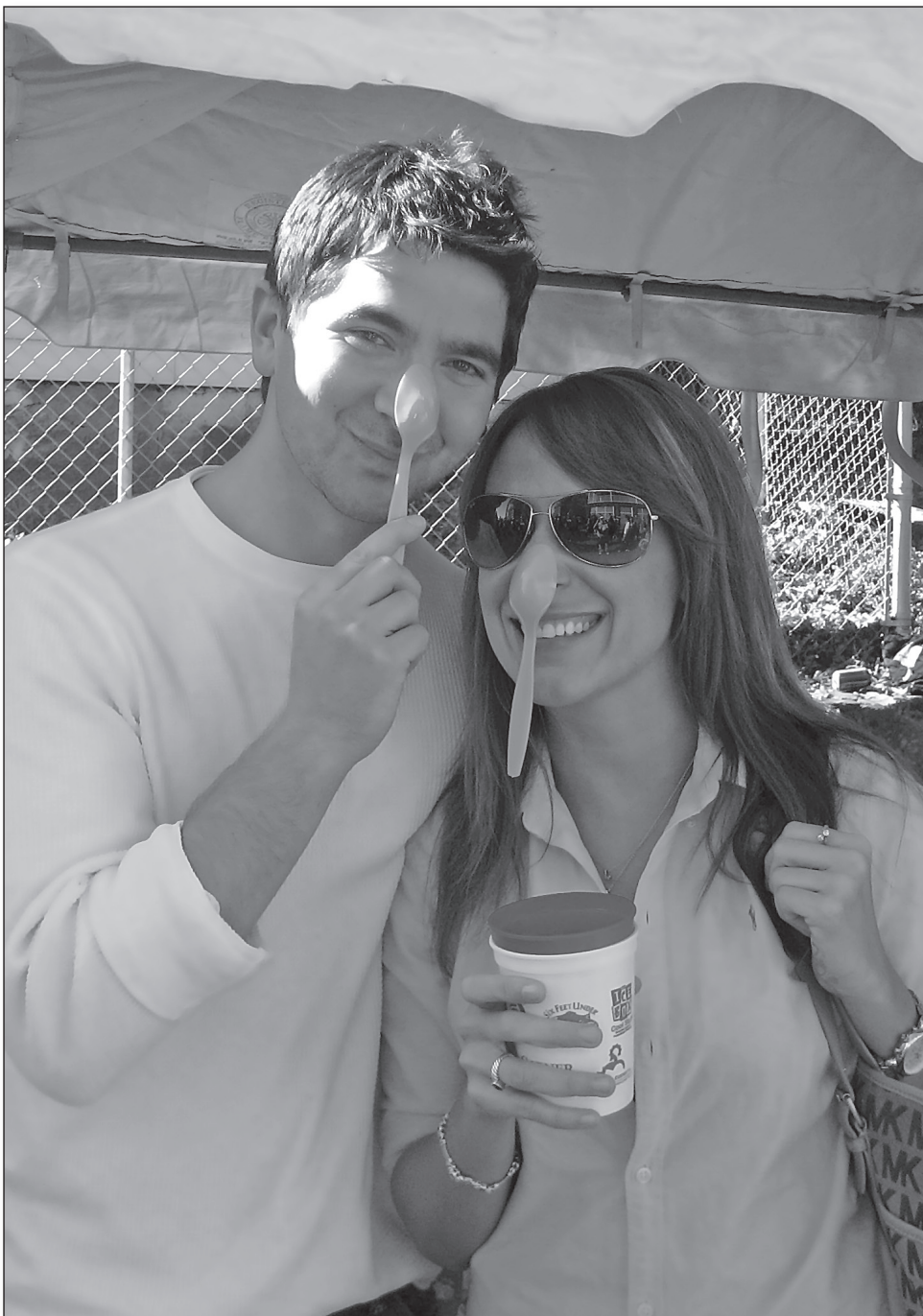

October 15th, 2015 – Cabbagetown Hall (Community Center)

1. Meeting Called to order at 7:02p by President Lyn Deardorff.

Minutes by NPU Representative, John Dirga.

2. New guests were introduced.

3. Valencia Hudson, Natalyn Archinbong's Public Safety Liaison addressed the community. Cabbagetown has "no issues whatsoever", except for a stolen car.

4. A business owner complained about people using other people's Herbie Curbie's.

5. Georgia Power has been going through neighborhoods clearing branches off of power lines.

6. Robert Tubbs, Public Safety Chair introduced Asst District Atty, Keith Lamar, community prosecutor for District 6. A suspect with 114 arrests was given a ban from the City of Atlanta. A multiple burglar was given 4 years and a ban from Zone 6. Another suspect is being arraigned next Wednesday for "entering auto". Join **Court Watch** to help release impact statements and convince judges to maximize sentences.

7. Keep your car clean (devoid of valuables) to avoid break-ins.

8. Officer Shaver addressed the community, he is dedicated to policing the Cabbagetown Community. Zone 6 is now on 10 hour shifts. Shaver is on 3p to 1a, with 3 shifts, 30 hours of policing per 24 hour period. Shaver caught a suspect on foot two hours ago! Go Shaver! APD is excited about the new small cars that can fit down smaller streets. No more black-out shifts where certain beats were closed for the evening. Don't zone out on the phone while walking down the street. Be careful of people asking you what time it is, because they want your phone, usually in groups of two or more. BOLO Silver Chevy Impala doing something weird, and call 911. Call the Zone 6 Statistics Officer if you'd like to know crime trends.

9. Last month's minutes approved unanimously.

10. Treasurer's report: \$5356.96, \$1850 in advert deposits, \$56.16 spent for food last meeting, auto \$569.16, contribution to Judy Staples Memorial Fund \$250 (matched by CI). \$6597.80 ending balance.

11. Hospitality Committee has been asked to spearhead the Holiday Crawl.

12. Stacks Loft+Artist Tour is Sat, December 7th. Crawl can be Sat 14th, or Fri December 6th.

13. CI Connect, Barb Keeney. Amping up for Chomp. \$12k for Romp t-shirts. Wait what? Romp is sold out. Clean-up Day was a success. CSX shrubs were cleaned up. Mini-Grants for "Making a Difference" (up to \$1500): 2 Movie Nights for **Sweet Cheats**, between **Memorial Tattoo & Little's** (private property) was cleaned with business

owner contributing \$500, **Mary Todd** will donate a picnic table. Added 10 tons of gravel to various properties. One property on Berean was missed, so there is still some work. Thanks to everyone who helped, especially Barb.

14. No HP applications. Still working on revising HP guidelines, and meeting with Doug Young.

15. Public Safety working with Neighborhood Watch reaching out to **COPS Project** (Community Oriented Policing). CryWolf.US@USS. atlantaga, False Alarm penalties have started. **97 Estoria** outside cameras are recording 24/7 covering the entire intersection. Footage will be available through **97 Estoria** and the Police Department.

16. Nicki, BTI, out of town. Next step is resurfacing and rails.

17. Cabbagetown HOPE, Michael McPherson, to expand park to purchase a private property inside the park limits. Raising money thru Milltown Tavern. Raised \$635 so far. **COA Invest Atlanta & Park Pride** are working with us to figure out a way forward.

18. NPU Report, John Dirga: Beltline PathForce advises: Don't use trail after 11p, dogs must be leashed, no smoking. Code Enforcement advises: Boarded up buildings are in violation after 6 months. Watershed Mgmt advises: there is a \$5-10/month warrantee available on old sewer/water lines, flood plain risk categories are changing (talk to your insurance agent), rake leaves so they don't clog sewers. Parks Dept is aware of the issues with C'town Park private property. Zoning: **Turner Studios** and **SunBelt** have special status on **BeltLine** overlay. 18 Story apartment building under construction near **The Masquerade**. Change of agent for the **Star Community Bar. Clairmont Hotel** requests variance for shorter/fatter parking deck. For more detailed NPU info, contact: johndirga@gmail.com

19. New By-Law Proposal. Submitted into records. Website update will include subscription service for special announcements. Ben Braxley is the Chair of the By-Law Committee. Highlights:

- a. No proxy voting
- b. Business Membership is limited to one representative, with a City of Atlanta Business License.
- c. Term Limits, two consecutive terms in same office
- d. Historic Preservation applications must be presented and printed in the Newsletter.
- e. CNIA can make discretionary spending without neighborhood vote as long as it is approved in the budget. Expenditures over \$500 require a signature.
- f. Membership Guidelines. No dues requirement, however, voting members must be pre-registered.
- g. Executive Committee expands the 4 Member Board to Chairs of the Major Committees (including Public Safety, Historic Preservation).

My marathon brainwaves

I've got to be honest. I've just been drawing a blank this month. It's cold, the days are getting shorter, and the time is ripe for me to just sit in front of the keyboard without any kind of plan or a goal in mind.

I've been blaming a lot of things for that state of affairs, but the truth is that I don't think I've been right in the head since I ran a marathon at the beginning of October.

That makes sense, I think. If you run a marathon, you're crazy. It's not right to expect not to feel crazy, too.

That craziness first showed itself in the week before the race. I had been talking to Ellie, and must have said that I was apprehensive about the race. So she asked me why. It's a sensible question, and there's an answer that seems to make sense - I'd been training for months, so of course I was nervous about how I'd do.

That's not the real answer, though. The real answer is that I was apprehensive because it was going to hurt a whole lot.

Now, think about that. It's not uncommon to be anxious about the future. And maybe it's not uncommon to be anxious about willingly walking into an imposing situation, like Normandy, or Gathering of the Juggalos. It's still crazy, though. Even crazier, I was going to inflict that pain over the course of four or five hours, actively electing not to stop at every single point.

It would be reassuring to know that I could stop at any time during the race, except that I knew with absolute certainty that I couldn't. I had intentionally and methodically eliminated all of the mental safety checks that normal people maintain in order to prevent themselves from running until they're dead.

I didn't even realize what the last safety check was until I ran a race for the first time. We were all packed together at the starting line, a crowd of 40,000 people all wearing the same kind of clothes. When I'm in a homogenous crowd like that, I'm not able to think, *"Isn't this life affirming and respectable?"* I have the sort of personality that assumes that any sufficiently large crowd wearing similar attire is experiencing some powerful group psychosis. To me, we were all about to take a very long and painful sip out of an enormous glass of Kool Aid.

Once you've done that and come out on the other side, maybe it's not surprising to find your mind wiped clean. I was totally focused on beating myself up for this marathon, and now I've got nothing. Maybe I shouldn't be surprised, then, to find myself up at three in the morning trying to make my deadline instead.

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20k from REI

Atlanta BeltLine Partnership Receives \$20,000 REI Grant for Adopt-the-Atlanta BeltLine Program.

The Atlanta BeltLine Partnership has received a second year of funding from REI in support of its Adopt-the-Atlanta BeltLine program. Doubling its previous gift, REI's \$20,000 grant will support the continued progress the 46 adopter groups are making along 8.2 miles of Atlanta BeltLine corridor currently included in the program.

"We are incredibly grateful for REI's continued support of the Adopt-the-Atlanta BeltLine program," said Atlanta BeltLine Partnership Executive Director Valarie Wilson. *"REI's commitment to the Atlanta BeltLine through this grant and other programs demonstrates the tangible impact private organizations can have in helping advance the Atlanta BeltLine vision."*

A partnership between Park Pride, Trees Atlanta, the Atlanta BeltLine Partnership, and Atlanta Beltline Inc., the Adopt-the-Atlanta BeltLine program launched in winter 2010. The program provides an opportunity for community groups to play a direct role in improving and maintaining the Atlanta BeltLine. Tools are provided free of charge to adopter groups by the Atlanta Community ToolBank, and the City of Atlanta Department of Public Works provides disposal support for the program.

"REI believes in the Atlanta BeltLine as a long-term investment in our community," said REI Market Manager for Atlanta Outdoor Programs & Outreach, Jason Lane. *"We are excited by the opportunity the Adopt-the-Atlanta BeltLine program presents to provide Atlantans to be hands-on stewards of this transformative project."*

Organizations interested in adopting a segment of the Atlanta BeltLine can log onto Adopt.BeltLine.org to identify a segment of the Atlanta BeltLine they would like to adopt by completing the form located on the page. From there, a contact from Park Pride will facilitate the adoption process. Participants will engage in activities to maintain their area at least monthly, including:

- Picking up litter
- Maintaining greenspace thru weeding and invasive plant removal
- Cleaning benches, signage, and other fixtures
- Reporting maintenance concerns, vandalism, or suspicious acts

"The business community has once again demonstrated that it is invested in helping maintain the Atlanta BeltLine through the Adopt-the-Atlanta BeltLine Program," said Atlanta BeltLine, Inc. CEO Paul Morris. *"With the incredible support of our partners and the community, this program will ensure that the Atlanta BeltLine continues to thrive and grow."*

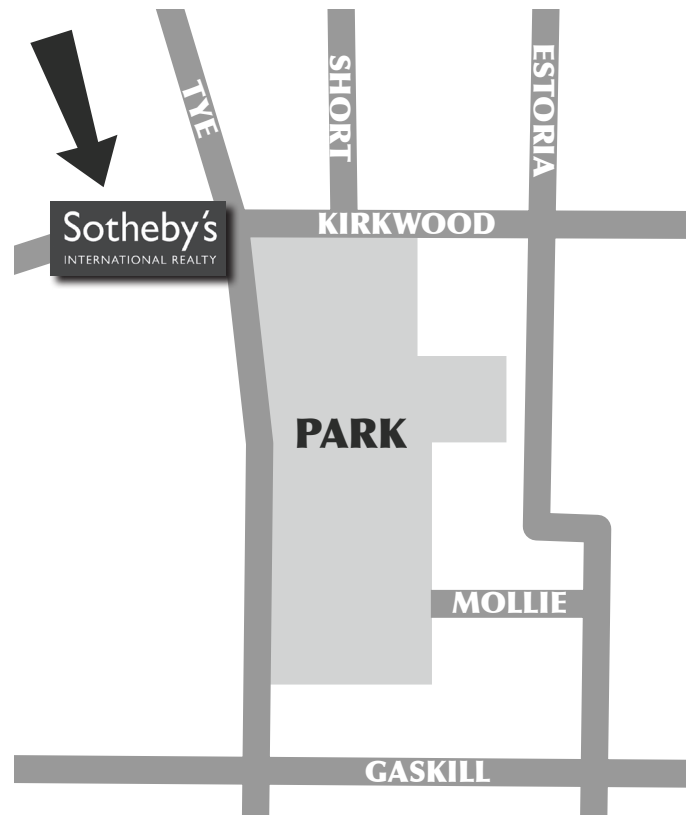

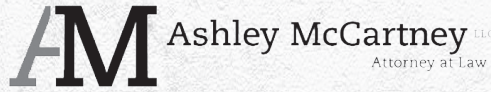

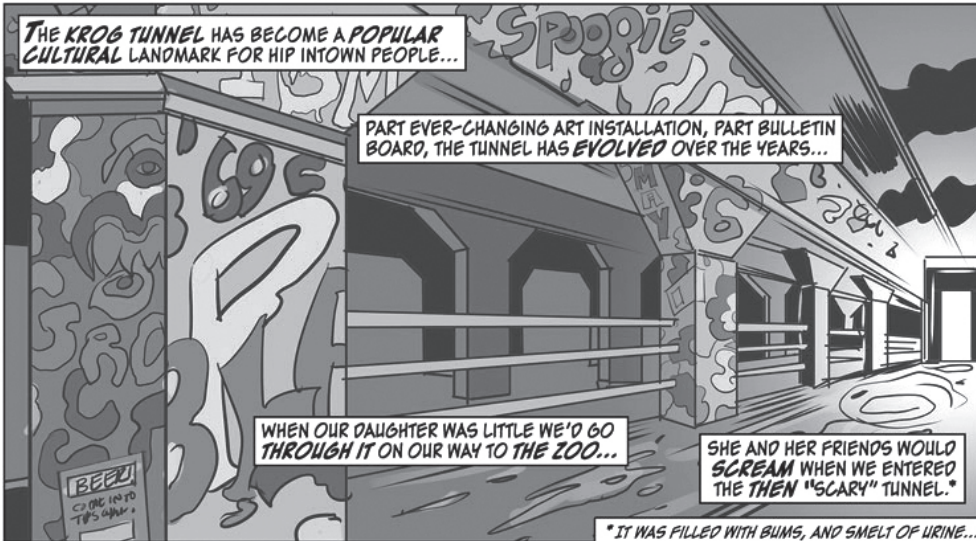

Historic Fourth Ward Park, located in Council District 2, was recently awarded "Project of the Year" by the Urban Land Institute Atlanta and named a "Frontline Park" by City Parks Alliance, a national urban park advocacy organization.

Historic Fourth Ward Park – which opened in 2011 – is an example of how municipalities can creatively solve stormwater drainage issues in urban neighborhoods while adding twenty-first century greenspace amenities for residents and families.



"These are great recognitions of all that we have been achieving in the Old Fourth Ward since we first convened the community in 2007 to envision the future," said Atlanta City Councilman Kwanza Hall, who represents that area. "Despite a national recession, Historic Fourth Ward Park has served as the catalyst for extraordinary residential, retail, and greenspace projects in the heart of the city."



Historic Fourth Ward Park is just south of Ponce City Market. Its 17 acres touch the Atlanta BeltLine's Eastside Trail and include a popular playground, open playing field, and the city's first skatepark.

Three months of free streetcar rides

The Atlanta Streetcar loop is slated to begin service in about six months — and for the first three months of operation, all rides will be free. How about them apples? Those updates come via Atlanta's deputy commissioner of public works and the streetcar project's executive director, Tim Borchers, who hosted a meeting last week to keep downtown neighbors up to speed, according to the ATL Urbanist blog. Borchers said construction is on time (following earlier delays) and \$2 million under budget. The 2.7-mile line, leaders hope, will be the initial seed of a more extensive transit network. It's expected to begin toting passengers on an east-west loop between Centennial Olympic Park and the King Historic District by the end of April. The route will have 12 stops, with an estimated 15 minutes between trains.



\$1 for a while, until MARTA upgrades its Breeze Card system to accommodate the light-rail route. Transfers from MARTA will be free. Borchers also noted that traffic lights along the route will be adjusted, in hopes of keeping the streetcar from being mired in congestion with the thousands of vehicles it will share lanes with.

Borchers, an Australian import with three decades of transit experience, took the streetcar helm in April, and he's bullish on the project's transformative potential. To prove it, he resides downtown and has suffered through streetcar construction like common folk. When he was installed, Borchers made

the following — and dare we say inspiring — comment in an interview with WABE: *"It's been happening all over the world. Streetcar systems are being used to rebuild decaying urban cores, give a financial boost to cities, relieve traffic, help the environment, and also, of course, provide public transportation."*

After the free-ride period, *ATL Urbanist* notes, rides will cost just
